VOLUNTEER COOPERATION IN COMPLETING NEW SHORT CRASH FORM WILL HELP DDOT COMPILE DATA ON PROPERTY DAMAGE CRASHES

The District Department of Transportation (DDOT) is seeking the public's cooperation in using a new short crash form to enable the agency to better identify crash locations throughout the District. DDOT is unveiling a new short crash form for drivers involved in non-injury fender-bender incidents. The District will use the Property Damage ONLY Crash Form to identify locations where these minor crashes occur, crashes typically not reported through the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD). MPD typically takes a report only when a crash involves an injury, damage to District or Federal property, a public transportation vehicle, or the motor vehicle sustains body or mechanical damage that renders it inoperable.

DDOT will only use data collected from these less severe crash reports to implement programs to improve road safety for all help in reporting these crashes, the District can target these crash locations and be better able to prioritize and address these problems before they escalate into more serious and/or fatal crashes.

Residents can obtain the Property Damage ONLY Crash Form from an MPD officer, and DDOT urges drivers to keep the forms in their vehicle's glove compartment. The packet includes a prepaid envelope and multiple copies that allow users to exchange driver information. The Property Damage ONLY form will also be available online on the DDOT and MPD websites. Bicyclists and pedestrians are also encouraged to submit the form if they are involved in a non-injury collision with a vehicle.

The request for information on these less severe crashes is on a volunteer basis. DDOT has no other way of tracking these crashes and encourages public cooperation in helping to improve safety on the District's roadways.

MPD CONTINUES EFFORTS TO KEEP COMMUNITY MEMBERS EDUCATED ON FILING POLICE COMMENDATIONS AND COMPLAINTS

The Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) is committed to providing quality, professional service to all members of the community. The MPD does its best to recognize individuals who provide exemplary service. Community members or visitors to DC who have had a positive experience with an MPD officer or civilian employee are invited to share their positive experiences by submitting a commendation.

Sometimes, however, individuals may feel that a member of the MPD has failed to meet that standard by engaging in misconduct or using excessive force. In these situations, individuals are encouraged to report this information to the MPD or the District of Columbia's Office of Police Complaints (OPC). The Office of Police Complaints is a District Government agency that is independent of the MPD, and its mission is to receive, investigate, and resolve police misconduct complaints filed by the public against MPD and DC Housing Authority Police Department officers.

The MPD will investigate all complaints, including anonymous complaints, in a fair, thorough, and impartial manner. OPC has the authority to investigate complaints alleging harassment; use of unnecessary or excessive force; use of language or conduct that is insulting, demeaning, or humiliating; discrimination; retaliation for filing a complaint with OPC; or failure to wear required identification or refusal to provide name and badge number when requested to do so by a member of the public.
