MPD USES YOUTUBE TO HIGHLIGHT COLD CASES IN AN EFFORT TO GENERATE NEW LEADS

Metropolitan Police Chief Cathy L. Lanier announced today an effort to highlight cold cases through YouTube videos in hopes of generating information from the public. The videos, produced by members of the Department's Cold Case Squad, feature family members discussing their loved ones and making appeals to the public for assistance.

"The community plays an important role in our efforts to reduce crime and close cases," said Police Chief Cathy L. Lanier. "When members of the community come to us with vital information, they know we will act upon that information. We have received numerous tips from the community in other cases and we hope to continue to build upon that momentum."

The cases include:

Marcus Johnson

On May 2006 35-year-old Marcus Johnson was fatally shot in the 1400 block of First Street, NW.


Melvin Seals

On April 2008 30-year-old Melvin Seals was fatally shot in the 1200 block of Morse Street, NE.

• Unique Harris

Twenty-four-year-old Unique Harris was last seen at her home in the 2400 block of Hartford Street, SE in October 2010.
