Patrols in DC neighborhoods are being boosted by the addition of 23 officers who were sworn in during a graduation ceremony on Friday, December 28, 2012, at the Metropolitan Police Academy in Southwest DC.

Training awards presented during the ceremony recognized Officer Colin Rettammel (Academic), Officer Brian Trainer (Firearms), Officer John Lewis (Vehicle Skills), and Officers Blanca Abrico and Nico Scott (Physical Skills). The new officers all completed approximately 24 weeks of training at the police academy, which includes a full program of physical, classroom, and firearms training to prepare them for the challenges of being a police officer. The subjects covered include laws of arrest, search and seizure, criminal law, traffic regulations, human relations, community policing, and ethics. In addition, recruit officers receive skills training in firearms, operation of emergency police vehicles, self-defense, advanced first aid, and much more.

Police work requires a certain type of individual — one who has strong interpersonal skills and the motivation to work with our partners to help build strong, safe and healthy communities throughout the District of Columbia.

## DDOT SNOW TEAM INITIATES FIRST FULL DEPLOYMENT OF THE SEASON; MPD OFFERS TIPS FOR DRIVING SAFELY IN INCLEMENT WEATHER

In anticipation of a winter storm predicted for this weekend, the DC Snow Team (Departments of Public Works and Transportation) will deploy 200 snow plows by 4 am on Saturday, December 29 and will pre-treat bridges, overpasses and other elevated structures with a brine and beet juice solution to reduce the possibility of freezing. The weather services predict about one inch of snow to accumulate in the District during the pre-dawn hours and then mix with rain after 9-10AM.

The Metropolitan Police Department wants drivers to be prepared in the future. If the temperatures drop below freezing, the streets can quickly get slick, forming a thin sheet of ice on the pavement.

Whenever the weather becomes unpleasant, motorists are advised drive with caution. If it's snowing or icy, stay far back from plows and spreaders so the drivers can see you. Remember that when it rains, sleets or snows, travelling in your vehicle will take longer than usual. Please be patient. Do not race to pass other vehicles, especially working plows or spreaders, as this is dangerous to you, the snow crews, and other motorists. Getting to your final destination safely is the number one priority, so maintain a safe distance between your vehicle and other cars, giving yourself the extra time and space necessary to stop during inclement weather.

In addition, commuters and residents are reminded to:

- · Do not drive distracted.
- · Listen to media reports for weather updates.
- Remember that driving on ice is significantly different than driving on snow. No cars handle well on ice. Even the tires a four-wheel-drive SUV will skid on ice.
- Drivers should use extreme caution and maintain safe speeds and distances from other vehicles during inclement weather.
- Pay attention to the road conditions, particularly black ice which can be deceptive in its appearance giving the driver a false sense of security on the road.
- Take note of Variable Message Signs placed strategically along local highways and corridors with messages like "Bridge Freezes before Roadway" and/or "Caution — Icy Conditions."
- Black ice is transparent ice located on the roadway making it very difficult to detect
  and becoming a major hazard to motorists. Warnings like the ones listed above are
  used to alert motorists where black ice is likely to occur.

Please remain alert and be aware of surrounding conditions including other vehicles and pedestrians.
