


Washington, DC's universities and hospitals are one of the most vital components of its economy. The Educational & Health Services sector is responsible for 17% of DC's total employment. Since 2010, this sector has grown more than 18%, compared to DC's total employment growth rate of nearly 6% during the same time period.

As both knowledge generators and exporters, the combined impact of DC's universities creates one of the largest economic engines in the region. The economic impact of these major DC universities approaches \$2 billion.<sup>1</sup>

During the academic year, nearly 80,000 students attend college at a Washington, DC college or university.<sup>1</sup> With enrollment and competition increasing, colleges and universities have built more than 5.1 million square feet of new dorms and academic centers in DC since 2001, with another 1.3 million square feet under construction.<sup>2</sup>


With 10 major hospitals and numerous expansion plans, DC has experienced a major increase in health care employment. The Health Care & Social Assistance sector has experienced an increase in employment of 11% from 2010–2014 and is responsible for nearly 9% percent of all DC employment. Employment is expected to continue to grow as several hospitals are undergoing major expansion plans, including MedStar Georgetown University Hospital's plan to build a new \$567 million medical and surgical pavilion.

## Major DC Hospital Expansion Projects<sup>7</sup>

- In 2016 MedStar Health will open a \$26 million, 112,000 sq. ft. outpatient services hub and sports medicine center in DC's central business district.
- MedStar Georgetown University Hospital plans to build a new \$567 million, 477,000 sq. ft. medical and surgical pavilion, next to the existing hospital. Construction could start in 2016 with delivery by 2020.
- MedStar Washington Hospital Center is scheduled to open its \$60 million Heart and Vascular Institute, DC's first heart hospital, in Summer 2016.
- Sibley Memorial Hospital will open its \$242 million, eight-story patient tower in 2016. The new building will include 200 private patient rooms, a floor dedicated to oncology care, including a 38-bay infusion center and a proton-beam therapy center.
