ANNUAL AWARDS FOR MERITORIOUS SERVICE

The annual awards for meritorious service are authorized by an Act of Congress to provide official recognition of outstanding acts performed in the line of duty by members of the Police and Fire Departments. The awards are made annually by a committee of five persons, consisting of the head of each department and three civilians appointed by the Commissioners of the District of Columbia. There is within the Police Department, a Departmental Board, consisting of officials of the department designated by the Chief of Police, which examines and classifies all records and reports submitted that indicate any act, or acts, of outstanding or conspicuous service by any member of the Police Force. The Departmental Board, after examination of the reports, compiles a brief of each case, which it forwards to the Commissioners' Committee for their consideration and judgement.

The awards for each fiscal year are not made in time for inclusion in the annual report for that year; therefore the awards reported in each annual report are those for the preceding fiscal year. The following awards were made to members of the Metropolitan Police Department for the fiscal year 1960.

GOLD MEDAL

Private Donald Brereton, deceased – Thirteenth Precinct

On January 7, 1960, Private Donald Brereton distinguished himself for courage and devotion to duty of the highest order when, with complete disregard for the risk involved, he pursued an armed criminal, who was responsible for a series of robberies, into a dark and unfamiliar alley. During a violent struggle which occurred when the vicious criminal leaped upon him from a hiding place in the alley, Private Brereton suffered a fatal gun-shot wound.

For this valorous service Private Donald Brereton was posthumously awarded the 1960 Police Department Gold Medal.

SILVER MEDAL

Corporal Patrick Sochocky – First Precinct

In the pre-dawn hours of September 12, 1960, Corporal Patrick Sochocky distinguished himself for conspicuous bravery by refusing to use his service revolver in the interest of the safety of the public while advancing upon and disarming a dangerous criminal who had already shot and seriously wounded two persons.

For his outstanding police service Corporal Patrick Sochocky was awarded the 1960 Police Department Silver Medal.

BRONZE BAR FOR VALOR

Private Paul Dortch – Ninth Precinct

On June 18, 1959, while directing traffic during the peak morning rush hour, Private Paul Dortch distinguished himself for alert judgement and courage of the highest order when, in the face of great personal danger, he leaped aboard an uncontrolled moving vehicle which had been involved in a collision and whose driver had been rendered unconscious, and guided the vehicle out of the path of on rushing traffic, narrowly averting a head-on collision.

For his outstanding police service Private Paul Dortch was awarded the 1960 Police Department Bronze Bar For Valor.

Private Keith J. Donahue – Eighth Precinct

In the early hours of March 26, 1960, Privates Donahue and Williams, while checking out a report of a woman screaming in the 2700 block of Macomb Street, observed a man hurriedly entering a car parked in that area. Blocking his escape with their Scout Car, these officers glanced up and down the street but could see no one else in view. Hearing no further screams, the officers focused their attention on the man whose departure they had blocked. Observing that he fitted, in many respects, the description of a man wanted for two cases of burglary and personal assault in Montgomery County, the officers placed him under arrest and removed him to the precinct station for further investigation. Over an hour later, an hysterical woman reported to the Police Department that she had been assaulted and raped and that after screaming for help she had fled to her home in terrified seclusion. Questioning of the suspect that these officers had picked up led to a confession of guilt to this assault and to the two cases reported in Montgomery County.

For this outstanding police service Privates Keith J. Donahue and Paul H. Williams were awarded the 1960 Police Department Bronze Bar for Merit.

Corporal George A. Gregg's – Fourteenth Precinct

While assigned to the task of tracking down the assailants who murdered an Air Force Sergeant in the 14th Precinct area on August 13, 1959, Corporal Gregg's, utilizing his intimate knowledge of his assigned district and the unsavory characters he met in his daily patrols, brought about the arrest of four suspects, one of whom admitted the actual murder and involved the others in the incident.

For his outstanding police service Corporal George A. Gregg's was awarded the 1960 Police Department Bronze Bar for Merit.

Private Robert C. Harris – Traffic Division

While off-duty and proceeding to the Traffic Division on his way to work on the evening of March 18, 1960, Private Harris overtook and stopped a speeding vehicle on the Sousa Memorial Bridge. The suspicious actions of the driver and his passenger during the routine questioning prompted Private Harris to take these men into the Fifth Precinct station house for further questioning and investigation which led to the eventual disclosure that both suspects were wanted on a housebreaking charge and that the driver was wanted on four additional housebreaking charges and a murder charge to which he has confessed his guilt.

For his outstanding police service Private Robert C. Harris was awarded the 1960 Police Department Bronze Bar for Merit.

MONTHLY AWARD OF MERIT

The "Award of Merit" is made monthly to individual members of the department who have performed outstanding or beneficial police service during the month. This award is not only for valor, but is also made for any outstanding contribution of time, effort, or result which has increased the efficiency of the department, created or cemented good public relations, or been a marked factor in advancing or improving service to the public.

The awards are made to persons selected by an "Award Committee," with no member of the Police Department participating. The committee consists of one representative from each of several newspapers which have offices in the city of Washington. When, in the judgement of the committee, there is no outstanding achievement suitable for awarding the medal during a particular month, no award is made; however, if during a single month there are more than one outstanding achievements, several awards may be made.

The monthly "Award of Merit Medals" were presented to the following officers during the fiscal year 1961:

JULY 1960

Private Carl E. Hirshman and Private Stuart E. Kaufman, Tenth Precinct, for courage displayed in the rescue of two small children from a burning home.

SEPTEMBER 1960

Private LaVerne W. Orcutt, Sixth Precinct, for outstanding police work in saving the life of a citizen who made an attempt to take her own life by inhaling carbon monoxide.

OCTOBER 1960

Private John A. Alleva, Jr. and Private Stanley J. Migacz, Eleventh Precinct, for outstanding police action in saving an infant from possible death by suffocation.

NOVEMBER 1960

Private Volney Wiley, Jr., Ninth Precinct, for outstanding police service which was credited with saving the life of a small boy who was rendered unconscious by a fall from a trailer.

FEBRUARY 1961

Detective Walter A. Phillips, Eighth Precinct, for outstanding courage and leadership in removing a number of patients from a burning nursing home.

MAY 1961

Private Michael A. Dello, Jr., Tenth Precinct, for outstanding police work resulting in the arrest of three men suspected of rape and robbery.

JUNE 1961

Private Volney Wiley, Jr., Ninth Precinct, for outstanding police service which in all probability was instrumental in saving the life of a small child who was struck by an automobile.



THE METROPOLITAN POLICE DEPARTMENT
FISCAL YEAR 1961

The Metropolitan Police Department is responsible for the prevention and detection of crime and the enforcement of all local and locally applicable statutes, regulations, and ordinances in the District of Columbia. Reductions of crime and of traffic accident rates are the major fundamental objectives of police operations.

During fiscal year 1961, serious offenses in the District increased for the fifth consecutive year to a total of 21,802, an increase of 9.4% from the previous year. It was an increase of 40.2% from the low point of fiscal year 1957, but still 11.4% below the all time peak of crime in January 1953.

The rate of traffic accidents, which increased during the fiscal years 1958, 1959, and 1960 to an all time fiscal year high of 22,113, was reduced slightly during 1961 to a total of 21,729. This change of trend is attributed to the benefits of the traffic radar unit which was placed into operation during the latter months of fiscal year 1960.

The difficulty with recruitment of police personnel, a major problem during fiscal year 1960, was overcome during 1961 by an extensive recruiting drive which was conducted by this department during November 1960.

Four teams of two men each were sent to those areas of surrounding states listed by the U. S. Department of Labor as having substantial labor surplus. Those teams distributed posters and brochures and arranged for newspaper, radio, and television announcements explaining the availability and benefits of employment with this department. As a result of that drive, applications for appointment to the force tripled, and by the end of the fiscal year the force was operating at full authorized strength.

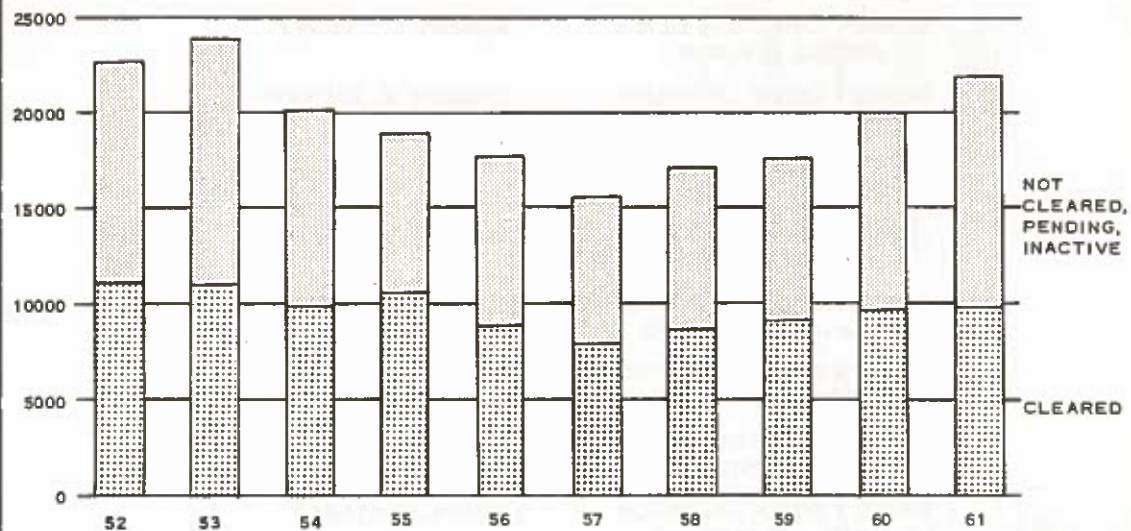
The legislation enacted by the Congress and approved June 27, 1961, to increase the minimum authorized strength of the force to three thousand officers and members represented an important advance for the department and will provide needed manpower to more effectively deal with the police problems now facing this community.

The Canine Corps, established during the fiscal year 1960, has proven itself a valuable addition to the patrol force. The man-dog teams have been successful in several instances in tracking and locating criminals who otherwise would probably have escaped detection and, as their successes continue, those teams should prove to be a strong psychological deterrent to criminal activity.

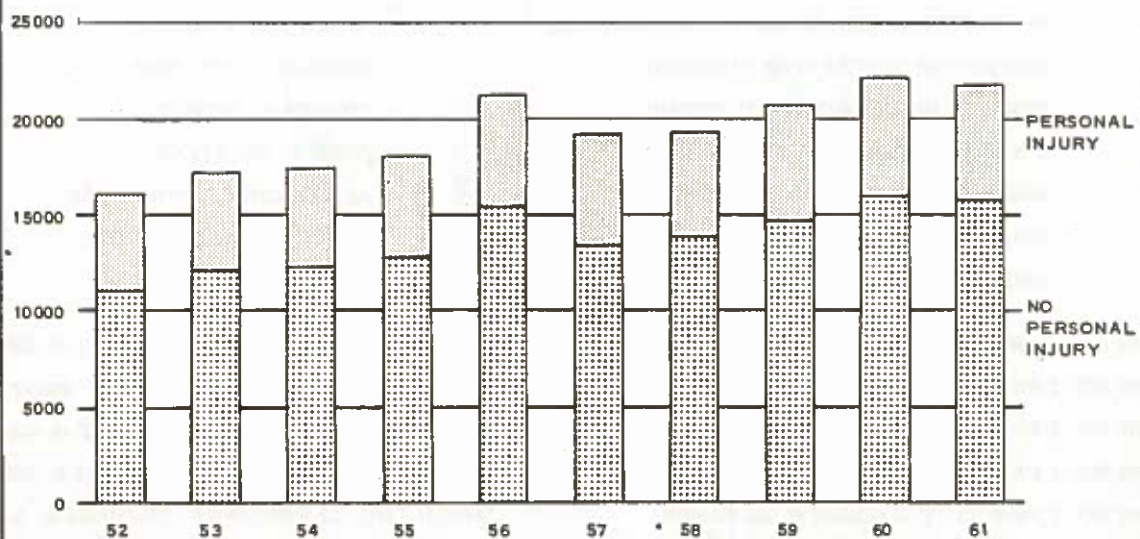
During fiscal year 1961, preliminary work was accomplished toward installation of an experimental system of two-way radio communication for foot patrolmen. This system, believed to be the first of its kind, will be placed into operation early in fiscal year 1962. If successful, this system may produce advantageous changes in methods of utilizing patrol personnel.

During the coming year, as in the past, the efforts of the Metropolitan Police Department will be directed towards increased efficiency of operations, methods, and techniques to cope with the changing trends and patterns of crime and other police problems within the District of Columbia.

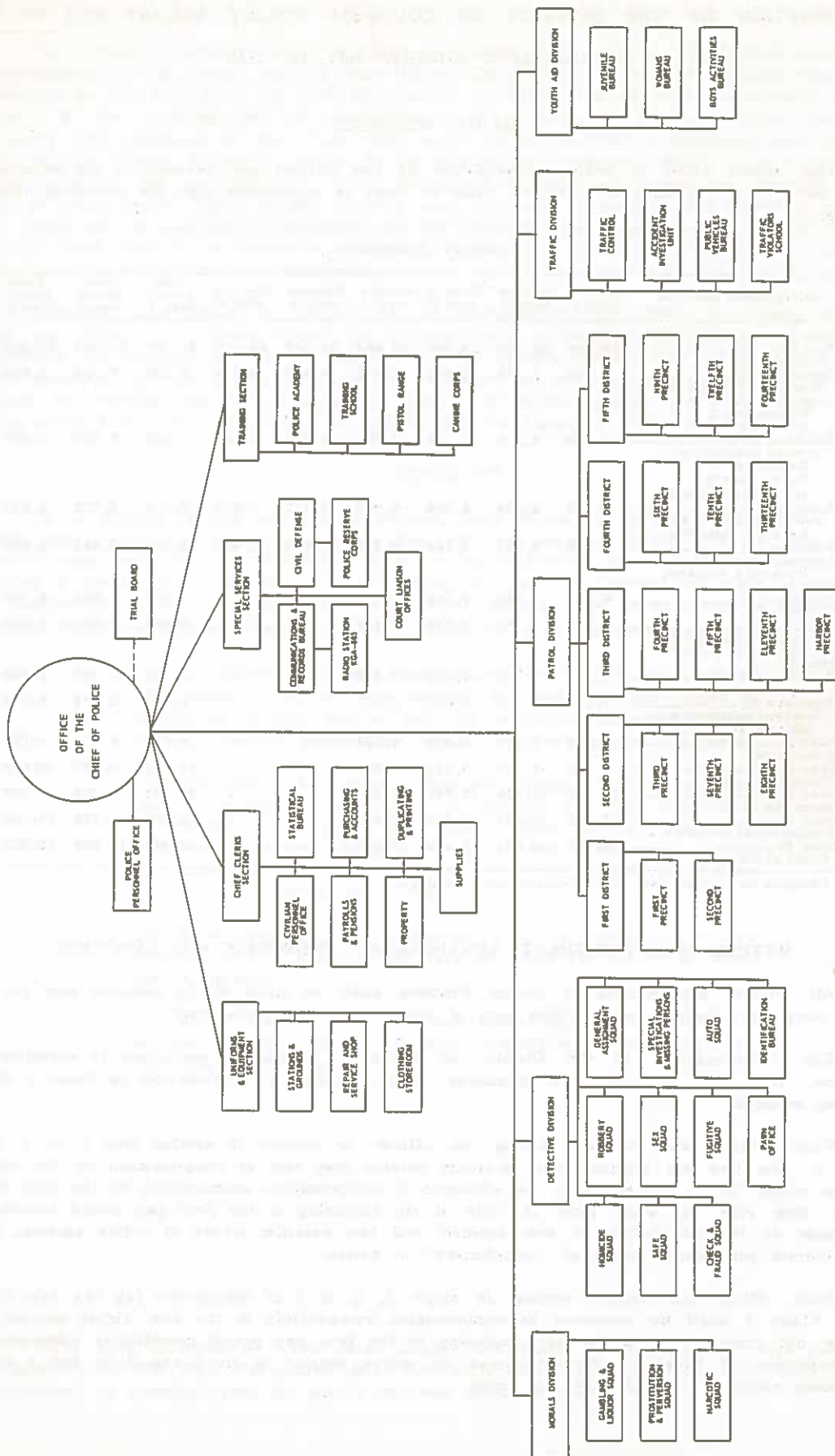

METHOD OF APPOINTMENT, ADVANCEMENT, PROMOTION AND DEMOTION

All original appointments of Police Privates shall be made at the minimum rate set forth in the foregoing schedule and the first year of service shall be probationary.

The Commissioners of the District of Columbia are hereby authorized to establish and determine, from time to time, the positions to be included as Technicians in Class 1 of the foregoing schedule.

Each officer and member, except an officer or member in service step 1, or 2, or 3, Class 1, who has not attained the maximum service step rate of compensation for the rank or title in which he is placed shall be advanced in compensation successively to the next higher service step rate for such rank or title at the beginning of the first pay period immediately subsequent to the completion of one hundred and four calendar weeks of active service, if he has a current performance rating of "satisfactory" or better.

Each officer and member serving in steps 1, 2, or 3 of Subclasses (a), (b), (c), (d), or (e) of Class 1 shall be advanced in compensation successively to the next higher service step rate for his current Subclass at the beginning of the first pay period immediately subsequent to the completion of fifty-two calendar weeks of active service in his Class if he has a current performance rating of "satisfactory" or better.

Any officer or member who is promoted or transferred to a higher Class shall receive basic compensation at the lowest rate of such higher Class which exceeds his existing rate of compensation by not less than one step increase of the Class from which he is promoted or transferred. If the existing rate of compensation of an officer or member is above the maximum longevity step increase in the Class from which he is promoted or transferred and there is no rate in the higher Class to which he is promoted or transferred, which is at least one step increase above his existing rate, such officer or member shall receive the maximum longevity rate of such higher Class or his existing rate, whichever is greater. Any officer or member in any Class who is assigned or transferred to any Subclass within the same Class shall be placed in the same service or longevity step in such Subclass as that which he was in immediately prior to being so assigned or transferred.

Whenever any officer or member of the Metropolitan Police force is changed or demoted from any Class to a lower Class, the Commissioners of the District of Columbia may, in their discretion, in changing or demoting such officer or member, fix his rate of compensation at any rate provided for the Class or Subclass to which he is changed or demoted which does not exceed his existing rate of compensation, except that if his existing rate falls between two step rates provided in such lower Class, he may receive the higher of such rates.

LONGEVITY

In recognition of long and faithful service, each officer and member shall receive an additional step increase (to be known as a longevity step increase) beyond the maximum scheduled service step rate for the Subclass in which he is serving, or for the Class in which he is serving if there are no Subclasses in his Class, for each two hundred and eight calendar weeks of continuous service completed by him at such maximum rate or at a rate in excess thereof, without change to a higher Class, subject to all of the following conditions:

- (1) No officer or member shall receive more than one longevity step increase for any two hundred and eight calendar weeks of continuous service, and in order to be eligible therefor he shall have a current performance rating of "satisfactory" or better.
- (2) Not more than three successive longevity step increases may be granted to any officer or member; nor shall any officer or member be granted a longevity step increase above the maximum scheduled longevity step in the Subclass in which he is serving or in the Class in which he is serving if there are no Subclasses in his Class.
- (3) Each longevity step increase shall be equal to one step increase of the Class or Subclass in which the officer or member is serving.
- (4) Each longevity step increase shall begin on the first day of the first pay period following completion of each two hundred and eight weeks.

Note: This condensation omits those classes and grades in the schedule which pertain only to members of the Fire Department and also omits those sections of the Act which pertain to the methods of transition from the old to the new salary schedule.

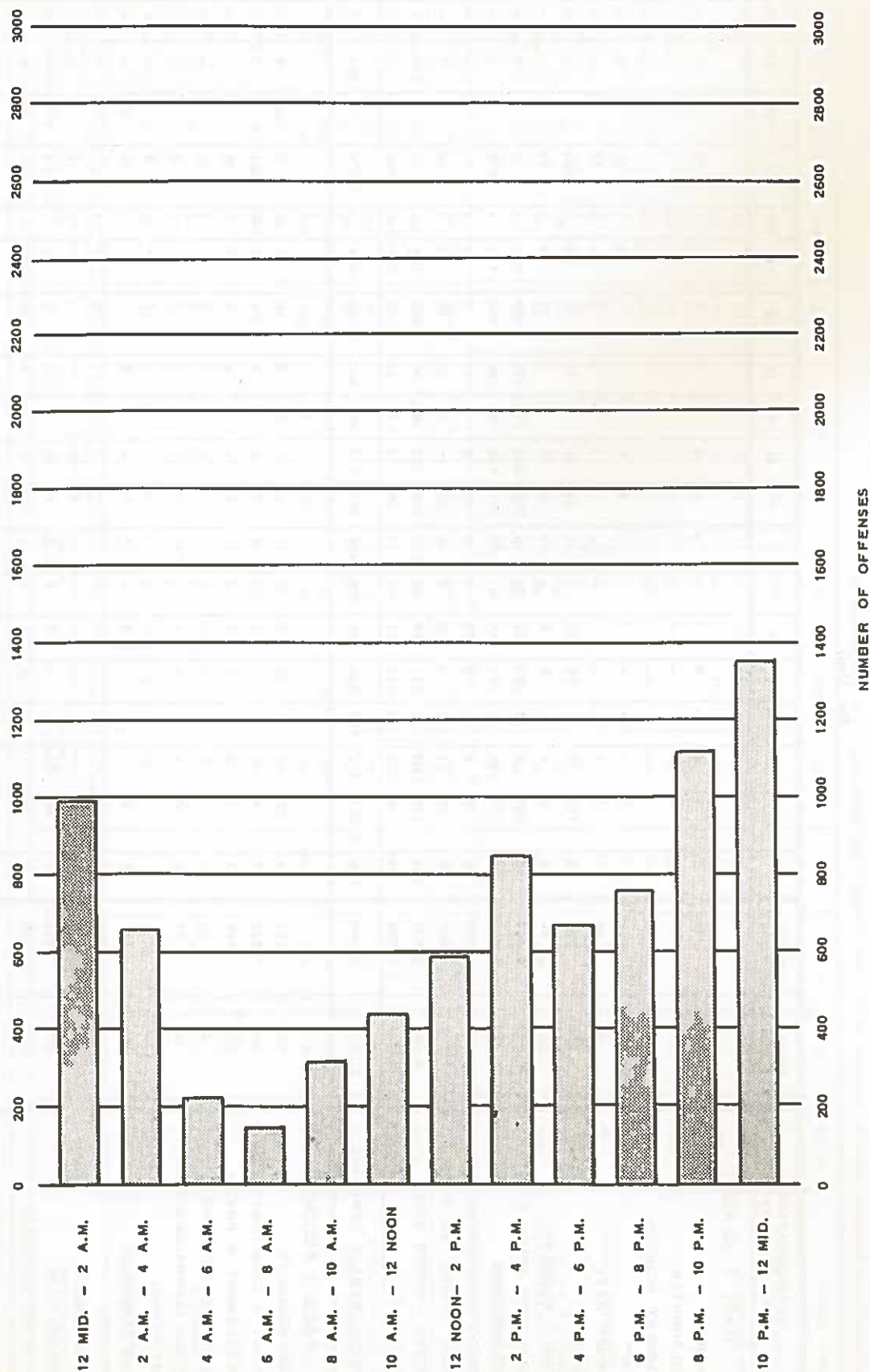
