THE METROPOLITAN POLICE DEPARTMENT
FISCAL YEAR 1962

During the fiscal year 1962, the total crime rate of the District demonstrated a relatively level trend. For the month of September 1961, the crime rate dropped by 7.3%, making that the first month within more than a year without an increase in crime and the first month in nearly three years to show a substantial decrease in serious crime.

Thereafter, throughout the remainder of the fiscal year, serious crime continued on a relatively level and slightly downward trend. Thus, by the end of the fiscal year, serious offenses, at 21,534 total, were 1.2% below the total of fiscal year 1961. The total of fiscal year 1962 was an increase of 38.4% above the low point of fiscal year 1957, but was still 12.5% below the peak of crime reached in January 1953.

Traffic accidents, which had decreased slightly during fiscal year 1961, resumed their former upward trend during 1962. By the end of the fiscal year, traffic accidents were at a peak of 24,262, an increase of 11.6% from 1961.

As a part of the traffic program of the department, arrangements were completed early during the fiscal year for inauguration of a traffic-copter service. The aircraft, a privately owned helicopter, is provided (with a pilot) by a private concern and is manned by a police officer observer who reports rush hour traffic occurrences to the police dispatcher and rush hour traffic conditions to the general public. This service has been very useful in expediting the flow of morning and evening rush hour traffic.

Recruitment of police personnel was not a major problem during fiscal year 1962. This department had the benefit during this year of the registers of applicants built up by the 1960 recruiting drive and, consequently, was able to fill the 130 new police positions authorized for this year with little difficulty.

There were three major changes in the organization of the department during the fiscal year 1962. On October 1, 1961, in accordance with the recommendation made by the Task Force of the department appointed by the Board of Commissioners, the Chief of Police issued an order placing all Detective personnel of the department under the immediate control of the Chief of Detectives; in February 1962, on recommendation of the Chief of Police, the Board of Commissioners authorized establishment of an Internal Investigations Unit; and, in April 1962, the Chief of Police transferred the Canine Corps from the Training Section and established it as a separate unit within the patrol division.

Among specific accomplishments which have improved the department during the fiscal year have been the obtaining of a tugboat for the Harbor Precinct, the establishment of the Footman Radio System on an experimental basis, and the establishment of a system whereby one police officer from each precinct testifies in court on all drunk charges where the persons arrested are pleading guilty.

The tugboat, which was obtained on loan from the Department of Defense, is a replacement for the Charles A. Evans, which was unsafe and unserviceable. The replacement tug will permit the Harbor Precinct to maintain icebreaking and rescue operations throughout the winter months.

The Footman Radio System, which was instituted on an experimental basis in the First Precinct, has proven invaluable as an aid in the prevention and detection of crime, and will be expanded to the extent funds are available during future fiscal years.

The program for having one officer handle all drunk cases from each precinct was initiated on recommendation of the Task Force of the Board of Commissioners. An experiment with that program in four precincts indicated potential savings of about 7500 hours of court time annually.





TRAFFIC OFFICER OF THE MONTH AWARD

On June 1, 1959, the Metropolitan Police Department inaugurated a program to select an officer who will be designated as the "Traffic Officer of the Month." This award is made to an officer of the Metropolitan Police Department who solves a serious crime, when the solution of the crime comes about as the result of a traffic arrest or investigation performed by the police officer.

Commanding Officers of all units submit reports to the Chief of Police, and these reports are reviewed by a committee of Police Department officials which makes the selection of "Traffic Officer of the Month." The officer so selected receives a \$50.00 U. S. Treasury Bond, Series E, from the D. C. Commissioners' Citizens' Traffic Board. When, in the judgement of the committee, there is no outstanding achievement suitable for award during a particular month, no award is made; however, if during a single month there are more than one outstanding achievement, several awards may be made.

The "Traffic Officer of the Month Awards," were presented to the following officers during the fiscal year of 1962.

JULY 1961

Private John F. Dashiell, Second Precinct, whose exceptional initiative and interest after observing a traffic violation resulted in the solution of a robbery case.

DECEMBER 1961

Private Charles C. Taylor and Private Bobby J. Wallace, Fourth Precinct, whose alertness, attention to duty and efficiency after observing a traffic violation resulted in the solution of an unauthorized use of automobile and housebreaking case.

MAY 1962

Private Douglas Scott and Private William P. Nolan, Traffic Division, whose alertness and investigation of a traffic violation brought to trial a subject wanted on traffic and criminal charges in other jurisdictions and by this action possibly prevented the perpetration of more serious crimes.

ANNUAL AWARDS FOR MERITORIOUS SERVICE

The annual awards for meritorious service are authorized by an Act of Congress to provide official recognition of outstanding acts performed in the line of duty by members of the Police and Fire Departments. The awards are made annually by a committee of five persons, consisting of the head of each department and three civilians appointed by the Commissioners of the District of Columbia. There is within the Police Department, a Departmental Board, consisting of officials of the department designated by the Chief of Police, which examines and classifies all records and reports submitted that indicate any act, or acts, of outstanding or conspicuous service by any member of the Police Force. The Departmental Board, after examination of the reports, compiles a brief of each case, which it forwards to the Commissioners' Committee for their consideration and judgement.

The awards for each fiscal year are not made in time for inclusion in the annual report for that year; therefore the awards reported in each annual report are those for the preceding fiscal year. The following awards were made to members of the Metropolitan Police Department for the fiscal year 1961.

SILVER MEDAL

Plainclothesman Walter A. Phillips – Eighth Precinct

On February 1, 1961, Plainclothesman Walter A. Phillips distinguished himself for alert, calm and courageous performance of duty when he observed dense smoke pouring from a four-story nursing home at 2301 Calvert Street, N. W., in which were housed many aged, bedridden and helpless persons. After notifying the Fire Department, Plainclothesman Phillips rushed into the building, reassuring those patients on the verge of hysteria, carrying and assisting others, co-ordinating the help of other able bodied persons, and demonstrating a calm and assured leadership until being overcome by smoke inhalation and shock, for which he was later hospitalized.

For this outstanding police service Plainclothesman Walter A. Phillips was awarded the 1961 Police Department Silver Medal.

BRONZE BAR FOR VALOR

Private Carl E. Hirshman – Tenth Precinct Private Stuart E. Kaufman – Tenth Precinct

On July 6, 1960, Privates Carl E. Hirshman and Stuart E. Kaufman distinguished themselves for alert and courageous performance of duty when they observed smoke pouring from a three-story residence in the 3500 block of 13th Street, N. W. After notifying the Fire Department they rushed into the building and removed two small children. While continuing the search of the building Private Hirshman lost consciousness and was carried to safety by Private Kaufman before he, too, collapsed.

For this outstanding police service Privates Carl E. Hirshman and Stuart E. Kaufman were awarded the 1961 Police Department Bronze Bar For Valor.

BRONZE BAR FOR VALOR

*Private Richard A. Dunn – First Precinct
Private Howard V. Bradshaw – Traffic Division*

On August 3, 1960, Privates Richard A. Dunn and Howard V. Bradshaw displayed exceptionally calm judgement and the highest degree of courage while subduing and disarming a deranged man who had fired several shots at these officers.

For this outstanding police service Privates Richard A. Dunn and Howard V. Bradshaw were awarded the 1961 Police Department Bronze Bar For Valor.

BRONZE BAR FOR VALOR

Lieutenant Vincent H. Jenkins – Fourteenth Precinct

On February 25, 1961, Lieutenant Vincent H. Jenkins responded to a house where a deranged man armed with a shotgun was barricaded on the second floor with his two young children. Lieutenant Jenkins distinguished himself for conspicuous bravery by refusing to use gunfire, and while acting as a decoy he lured the deranged gunman to a location where he was safely disarmed.

For this outstanding police service Lieutenant Vincent H. Jenkins was awarded the 1961 Police Department Bronze Bar For Valor.

BRONZE BAR FOR MERIT

Private Michael A. Bello, Jr. – Thirteenth Precinct

On May 10, 1961, Private Michael A. Bello, Jr., while off duty, was cruising the northeast section of Washington in an effort to assist in the apprehension of the persons responsible for a robbery. As a result, he discovered a sport coat containing a pay envelope and a .32 calibre pistol cartridge. A further investigation of these articles by the Robbery Squad led to the arrest of three vicious criminals.

For this outstanding police service Private Michael A. Bello, Jr., was awarded the 1961 Police Department Bronze Bar For Merit.

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MONTHLY AWARD OF MERIT

The "Award of Merit" is made monthly to individual members of the department who have performed outstanding or beneficial police service during the month. This award is not only for valor, but is also made for any outstanding contribution of time, effort, or result which has increased the efficiency of the department, created or cemented good public relations, or been a marked factor in advancing or improving service to the public.

The awards are made to persons selected by an "Award Committee," with no member of the Police Department participating. The committee consists of one representative from each of several newspapers which have offices in the city of Washington. When, in the judgement of the committee, there is no outstanding achievement suitable for awarding the medal during a particular month, no award is made; however, if during a single month there are more than one outstanding achievements, several awards may be made.

The monthly "Award of Merit Medals" were presented to the following officers during the fiscal year 1962:

JULY 1961

Lieutenant Vincent H. Jenkins, Fourteenth Precinct, for a thorough and resourceful investigation climaxed by the arrest of three vicious rapists.

SEPTEMBER 1961

Detective Lieutenant Grayston W. Chapman, Supervisor, Second District Detectives; Detective Robert F. DeMilt and Plainclothesman Thomas P. Reilly, Third Precinct, for outstanding police work resulting in the arrest of a vicious criminal.

NOVEMBER 1961

Private Sherwood N. Conner and Private J. Frank McClure, Eleventh Precinct, for prompt response and competent handling of an emergency birth of a baby.

DECEMBER 1961

Private Allen R. Hefner and Private Walter T. Behe, Eleventh Precinct, for outstanding police service in rescuing a small boy from a collapsed tunnel.

JANUARY 1962

Private John E. Timmons, Traffic Division, for outstanding courage displayed in the face of gun fire while subduing a deranged criminal.

FEBRUARY 1962

Private James J. Rehill Jr. and Private John J. McGroarty, Tenth Precinct, for outstanding police work which led to the arrest of a murder suspect.

MARCH 1962

Private Houston M. Bigelow and Private Donald A. Wheeler, Fourteenth Precinct, for outstanding courage displayed while apprehending a murder suspect.

MAY 1962

Detective Sergeant Alpheous B. Masters, Identification Bureau, for outstanding police service in identifying a robbery suspect.





METHOD OF APPOINTMENT, ADVANCEMENT, PROMOTION AND DEMOTION

All original appointments of Police Privates shall be made at the minimum rate set forth in the foregoing schedule and the first year of service shall be probationary.

The Commissioners of the District of Columbia are hereby authorized to establish and determine, from time to time, the positions to be included as Technicians in Class 1 of the foregoing schedule.

Each officer and member, except an officer or member in service step 1, or 2, or 3, Class 1, who has not attained the maximum service step rate of compensation for the rank or title in which he is placed shall be advanced in compensation successively to the next higher service step rate for such rank or title at the beginning of the first pay period immediately subsequent to the completion of one hundred and four calendar weeks of active service, if he has a current performance rating of "satisfactory" or better.

Each officer and member serving in steps 1, 2, or 3 of Subclasses (a), (b), (c), (d), or (e) of Class 1 shall be advanced in compensation successively to the next higher service step rate for his current Subclass at the beginning of the first pay period immediately subsequent to the completion of fifty-two calendar weeks of active service in his Class if he has a current performance rating of "satisfactory" or better.

Any officer or member who is promoted or transferred to a higher Class shall receive basic compensation at the lowest rate of such higher Class which exceeds his existing rate of compensation by not less than one step increase of the Class from which he is promoted or transferred. If the existing rate of compensation of an officer or member is above the maximum longevity step increase in the Class from which he is promoted or transferred and there is no rate in the higher Class to which he is promoted or transferred, which is at least one step increase above his existing rate, such officer or member shall receive the maximum longevity rate of such higher Class or his existing rate, whichever is greater. Any officer or member in any Class who is assigned or transferred to any Subclass within the same Class shall be placed in the same service or longevity step in such Subclass as that which he was in immediately prior to being so assigned or transferred.

Whenever any officer or member of the Metropolitan Police force is changed or demoted from any Class to a lower Class, the Commissioners of the District of Columbia may, in their discretion, in changing or demoting such officer or member, fix his rate of compensation at any rate provided for the Class or Subclass to which he is changed or demoted which does not exceed his existing rate of compensation, except that if his existing rate falls between two step rates provided in such lower Class, he may receive the higher of such rates.

LONGEVITY

In recognition of long and faithful service, each officer and member shall receive an additional step increase (to be known as a longevity step increase) beyond the maximum scheduled service step rate for the Subclass in which he is serving, or for the Class in which he is serving if there are no Subclasses in his Class, for each two hundred and eight calendar weeks of continuous service completed by him at such maximum rate or at a rate in excess thereof, without change to a higher Class, subject to all of the following conditions:

- (1) No officer or member shall receive more than one longevity step increase for any two hundred and eight calendar weeks of continuous service, and in order to be eligible therefor he shall have a current performance rating of "satisfactory" or better.
- (2) Not more than three successive longevity step increases may be granted to any officer or member; nor shall any officer or member be granted a longevity step increase above the maximum scheduled longevity step in the Subclass in which he is serving or in the Class in which he is serving if there are no Subclasses in his Class.
- (3) Each longevity step increase shall be equal to one step increase of the Class or Subclass in which the officer or member is serving.
- (4) Each longevity step increase shall begin on the first day of the first pay period following completion of each two hundred and eight weeks.

Note: This condensation omits those classes and grades in the schedule which pertain only to members of the Fire Department and also omits those sections of the Act which pertain to the methods of transition from the old to the new salary schedule.


