A Brief History

In 1790, Maryland and Virginia ceded portions of their territory for the purpose of establishing the Federal City. For the next 10 years, the Federal City was policed by constables appointed by these two states. In 1802, when the original charter of Washington was approved, police authority was centralized and power was granted to the city itself to establish patrols, impose fines,

granted to the city itself to establish patrols, impose fines, and establish inspection and licensing procedures. Until the creation of the Metropolitan Police Department in 1861, the city had only an auxiliary watch with one captain and 15 policemen.

In 1861, President Abraham Lincoln took personal interest in founding a regular police department for the District of Columbia. It was a time of constant danger in the Nation's Capital. With the beginning of the Civil War, an army was billeted in the city, government employees were increased by ten-fold, and hordes of unsavory elements descended upon the District's few square miles. President Lincoln personally dispatched an emissary from the newly created Board of Metropolitan Police



Commissioners to New York City to become familiar with that system, which itself was based on the world-acclaimed Metropolitan London Police Department.

The ideas and knowledge gained from this study led to the creation of the Metropolitan Police Department on August 6, 1861. In September of that year, attorney William B. Webb was appointed the first Superintendent of the Police, with an authorized force of 10 sergeants and a number of patrolmen as needed, but not to exceed 150. Up to 10 precincts were authorized. The Superintendent of Police was paid \$1,500 annually, with sergeants earning \$600 and patrolmen \$480.

The sergeants and most of the personnel for two precincts were sworn in that September. Officers had to be US citizens, able to read and write the English language, have been DC residents for two years, never convicted of a crime, between 25 and 45 years of age, and at least five feet, six inches tall. The men went to work right away in 12-hour shifts, seven days a week with no days off and



no vacations. They were issued neither equipment nor badges, and they had to obtain their own handguns. The first arrest made by a Metropolitan Police officer was on a charge of intoxication.

COP Special Award Recipients

Donald Graham

Before joining The Washington Post as a reporter in 1971 and holding several news and business positions at the company, Donald Graham wanted to understand the city where he had grown up, so when he returned from serving in Vietnam, where he was drafted to the 1st Cavalry Division during the war, Donald decided to join the DC police department. Because of his appreciation for his hometown, the Department and its members, he helped to finance the DC Police Memorial, which honors fallen police officers. His contributions continue to serve as an inspiration to many members of law enforcement across the city.

Don Blake

After 48 years of law enforcement and security services, Don Blake retired on June 31, 2008. While with MPD, Don received over 100 commendations, including five official recognitions from the Chief of Police, the District of Columbia Award for Meritorious Services, and the Silver Medal of Valor. In 2010, he established the DC Police Memorial and Museum foundation to honor and remember DC Police Officers who paid the ultimate sacrifice. He is a lifetime member of the Department and continues to pave a strong path for law enforcement members to follow.

Matthew Graves

Matthew Graves was confirmed by the United States Senate on October 28, 2021, and sworn in on November 5, 2021, as the United States Attorney for the District of Columbia. He first joined the Office in 2007 as a line Assistant United States Attorney, serving with distinction in both the Superior Court and Criminal Divisions. He began his legal career as a judicial law clerk to the Honorable Richard W. Roberts, then United States District Court Judge for the District of Columbia. Thereafter, he joined the Washington, DC, office of Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering (now Wilmer Hale). Prior to his nomination and commission as United States Attorney, Matthew was a litigation and compliance partner in the Washington, DC, office of DLA Piper.


HSB Bureau Sworn Employee of the Year

Detective O'Bannon's dedication and effectiveness at closing his investigations show throughout the year — he completed the year with a 100 percent closure rate, and has since closed 10 of his last 11 assigned cases with a pending arrest in the 11th.

Since beginning his assignment in the Homicide Branch more than 15 years ago, Detective Joshua Branson has maintained sustainable success in investigating and closing homicide cases, as well as bringing justice to many families of victims across the District.



In multiple instances, sometimes many years after an incident occurred, Detective Branson never lost momentum, continued to conduct numerous grueling interviews, and reviewed voluminous CCTV footage and other evidence until he apprehended the suspect and bought closure to the victim's loved ones. Detective Branson's most highprofile cases in 2022 include the heavily-armed sniper near the Edmund Burke School in Van Ness on April 22 and the homeless attacker who targeted victims in Washington, DC, and New York City.

Investigator Best was instrumental in the first successful mass fatal overdose investigation in the District. Due, in part, to his efforts, two suspects were identified and charged in US District Court for distributing fentanyl, resulting in death or physical harm. The VCIT Team and Investigator Pearce Best employed a range of tactics to solve this case, including undercover operations, surveillance, and numerous interviews with witnesses, survivors, and family and friends of the deceased. They also examined cell phone records and hours of CCTV footage and recovered forensic evidence.



Community Focused Patrol Unit (CFPU)




Officer of the Year
