DC PREPARES FOR PAPAL VISIT, SEPTEMBER 22-24

Pope Francis will be visiting the District of Columbia September 22-24, 2015, and most people who live, work or regularly visit the city know that security measures, including street closures and parking restrictions will make getting around – especially by car – fairly difficult on those days. Anyone



who plans to attend an event related to the Pope's Visit is encouraged to utilize public transportation. The Office of Personnel Management is encouraging federal employees to telework during the Pope's Visit.

The Pope will be busy during his visit, making stops at the Vatican Embassy (September 22); the White House, the Cathedral of St. Matthew the Apostle, the Basilica, and St. Patrick's Catholic Church (September 23); and the US Capitol (September 24).

On the morning of Wednesday, September 23, after leaving the White House, Pope Francis will travel along 15th Street, Constitution Avenue and 17th Street, NW in the Popemobile. This parade is the only non-ticketed event for people wishing to see the Pope. The parade will begin around 11 am and is free and open to the public on a first-come first-serve basis. However, spectators will need to pass through security, with gates opening for the Ellipse and the National Mall at 4 am on September 23 and closing at 10 am. No one will be admitted into the area after that point in time. Once inside the perimeter, attendees will not be allowed to leave and re-enter until the Holy Father's Popemobile parade is complete.

All attendees, including the general public and ticketed guests, will be subject to a thorough security screening before entering the Papal motorcade route or designated Papal events. Please be advised that all Washington D.C. Papal sites, with the exception of the parade, are ticketed events. No other individuals will be allowed access. Please allow additional time for these security screenings. A complete list of items prohibited from entry into any Papal events in Washington DC available via the links below. Please note that drones and other unmanned aircraft systems are included in the list of prohibited items.

MPD TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK INITIATIVE ON SEPTEMBER 26

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) has scheduled a National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day which will take place on Saturday, September 26, 2015, from 10 am to 2 pm. The Metropolitan Police Department is providing the public with a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposing of prescription drugs. We urge the

community to take advantage of this opportunity to discard unwanted, unused, and expired prescription drugs.

The National Prescription Drug Take-Back addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Many Americans are not aware that medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are at alarming rates, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that many abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, many Americans do not know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them down the toilet or throwing them away - both potential safety and health hazards.

"Prescription drug abuse is a huge problem and this is a great opportunity for folks around the country to help reduce the threat," Rosenberg said. "Please clean out your medicine cabinet and make your home safe from drug theft and abuse."

In the previous nine Take-Back events nationwide from 2010-2014, 4,823,251 pounds, or 2,411 tons of drugs were collected.
