PETER NEWSHAM SWORN IN AS INTERIM CHIEF OF POLICE

On Thursday, September 16, 2016, following the retirement of Cathy L. Lanier, Mayor Muriel Bowser swore Peter Newsham in as interim Chief of Police.Interim Chief Peter Newsham joined the MPD in 1989 and rose quickly through the ranks, serving in a number of district operational assignments. He was promoted to Commander of the Second District in January 2000.

Two years later, in June, Newsham was promoted to Assistant Chief in charge of the Office of Professional Responsibility (OPR), which included the Internal Affairs Division, Civil Rights and Force Investigation Division and Compliance Monitoring



Team, responsible for overseeing the MPD's Memorandum of Agreement with the US Department of Justice. Newsham took the position of Assistant Chief in Charge of ROC-North in July 2004.

On September 23, 2007, Chief Lanier announced a reorganization to the Metropolitan Police Department and put Assistant Chief Newsham in charge of the Internal Affairs



Bureau. In 2008, Assistant Chief Newsham was named the Assistant Chief of the Investigative Services Bureau. Mayor Muriel Bowser appointed Newsham Interim Chief of Police in September 2016.

Newsham holds a bachelor's degree from the College of the Holy Cross and a law degree at the University of Maryland School of Law. He is a member of the Maryland Bar.

USE THE HSEMA MOBILE APP FOR INFORMATION IN AN EMERGENCY OR DISASTER

No one is ever ready for an emergency but you can be prepared. When you know where to get information, have the right supplies, and have a plan for you, your loved ones, and your pets, you can protect yourself and your family before a crisis and for at least 72 hours afterwards.

The Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agency (HSEMA) iPhone/ iPad/Android application contains important information you can use before, during and after an emergency or disaster such as:

- Emergency evacuation routes that lead you out of the District
- Alert DC emergency text alerts
- Current weather outlooks from the National Weather Service
- Disaster safety tips
- Help lines that provide telephone numbers to essential emergency resources and information
- A calendars informing the public about emergency preparedness training, HSEMA Community Outreach events as well as special events such as marathons and street festivals
- A direct link to the local transit authority's (METRO) main website and twitter page
- List of shelters that are opened after a disaster occurs
- A direct link to FEMA's website,
- Maps of where District Police and Fire stations are located
- Regional preparedness links
- Steps to take to make a family emergency plan, a go kit, and much more!

The tools in this app help ensure that no matter where you are or what you are doing you'll be prepared.
