- The MPD is looking for volunteers to join the MPD's Reserve Corps, which provides qualified civic-minded individuals with the opportunity to assist the MPD in carrying out its policing responsibilities. The new officers all completed approximately 28 weeks of training at the police academy, which includes a full program of physical, classroom, and firearms training to prepare them for the challenges of being a police officer. The subjects covered include laws of arrest, search and seizure, criminal law, traffic regulations, human relations, community policing, and ethics. In addition, recruit officers receive skills training in firearms, operation of emergency police vehicles, self-defense, advanced first aid, and much more.

Police work requires a certain type of individual — one who has strong interpersonal skills and the motivation to work with our partners to help build strong, safe and healthy communities throughout the District of Columbia.

## EXCHANGE ZONES PROVIDE SAFE LOCATIONS FOR BUYING, SELLING OR TRADING ITEMS FOUND ONLINE

Several individuals in the District of Columbia have been targeted after using mobile marketplace applications to buy or sell items. Suspects have used these online platforms to lure victims to meet them at locations to purchase or sell an item and when the victim arrives, a pre-staged robbery occurs.

To combat robberies Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) have designated three Exchange Zone areas. These areas will serve as a safe place for residents and visitors to exchange and complete transactions of online purchases. Exchange Zones deter many of these types of robberies by providing well-lit areas that are near police stations, giving Washingtonians a

safe place to purchase or exchange property. The three Exchange Zone locations include:

- Special Operations Division's Harbor Patrol/ 550 Water Street, Southwest,
- Third District/ 1620 V Street, Northwest,
- Sixth District/ 5002 Hayes Street, Northeast

MPD would also like to remind the public of these safety tips when selling or purchasing items from strangers:

- Never meet anyone alone.
- Never list your home address, phone number, or any other identifiable information.
- Never meet at night.

## REMINDER TO YOUNG PEOPLE AND FAMILIES: CURFEW IN EFFECT YEAR ROUND; SCHOOL YEAR HOURS BEGAN 9/1

The MPD offers this reminder to young people and their families concerning DC's teen curfew: From September 1 through June 30, DC's curfew for young people under the age of 17 starts at 11 pm, Sunday through Thursday nights, and at 12:01 am on weekends. During the summer (July and August) DC's curfew starts at 12:01 am, and continues until 6 am seven days a week. This is an hour later than the weeknight curfew during school months. Under DC law, persons under the age of 17 cannot remain in or on a street, park or other outdoor public place, in a vehicle or on the premises of any establishment within the District during curfew hours, unless they are involved in certain exempted activities. These include work, school, religious, civic or organized recreational activities, as well as the exercise of First Amendment rights. DC's curfew law applies to all young people who are in the District during curfew hours, regardless of whether they live inside or outside the city. During the first eight months of 2016, the MPD has processed over 700 curfew violators.
